
Through our newsletter, membership directory, workshops and symposia we seek to:

\*Promote professionalism and ethical excellence in the field of wildlife rehabilitation.


\*Foster an understanding of, and support for, wildlife rehabilitation among wildlife management agencies, the veterinary community and the general public.








## What is Wildlife Rehabilitation?

Wildlife rehabilitation involves temporary care of injured, orphaned, or sick wildlife with the intent of returning them back to their natural habitat.

Wildlife rehabilitators are trained, skilled, and licensed to provide specialized care for native wildlife. They work to provide high quality care to injured, orphaned, displaced, or distressed wildlife by providing specie specific needs, including housing and diets, based on natural history of the animal so they can thrive and survive in the wild.



## What you should do if you find orphaned or injured wildlife

- The best chance for survival for wildlife is to stay with their wild parents.

- If the animal is in need of assistance, contact a wildlife rehabilitator for advice before any rescue attempt.

- You can find a rehabilitator by calling your County Warden or local Humane Society for referral.

- You may give water but DO NOT feed. Improper foods could harm the animal or cause death.

- If you need to rescue the animal, place it in a box with small air holes or a pet carrier. Keep your safety in mind for all attempted rescues. Keep the animal in a warm, dark, quiet place until you can transport it to a rehabilitator.
